# **Progress**

This quarter we continued our Love Food Hate Waste Library Tour to spread the word about reducing food waste, visiting 10 more libraries before the tour finished at the end of October 2015.

In October we also participated in 2 Love Food Hate Waste trolley dash events in Hounslow (12<sup>th</sup>) and Harrow (13<sup>th</sup>) high streets. Working with Barclays volunteers, Rubbish Diet, Love Food Hate Waste and the Recycling teams from both boroughs, we paraded up and down the

High St, giving out tips, hints and messages to over 300 residents about how they can reduce their food waste at home.

Over the last 3 months...

- we've spoken to 847 people
- given out 591 of our Spud and Slice/7top tip leaflets
- 480 recipe cards have been taken home for use
- 338 spaghetti measurers have been given out
- 476 bag clips were given to people who spoke to us



As well as events we've been shouting about food and reducing food waste online as well. There were 5 web articles about food between October and December and 84 food tweets shared. There have been 118 views of the saveaspud and saveaslice webpages featuring tips specifically targeting bread and potato waste.

### Over the next few months...

As the outdoor event season has finished there will be more of a focus on Love Food Hate Waste talks to community groups and the setting up for our Ready, Steady Love Food Evening event on the 25<sup>th</sup> Feb.

# **Progress**

There have been 3 Swishes this quarter - 2 held in libraries and one Little Big Swish event held at the New Inn pub in Ealing. A total of 62 people Swished 419 items weighing approximately 147kg.

For our second Little Big Swish, the format remained largely the same and Gema was invited back to hold




information they need to run their own swishing events is still live and received 514 visitors between October and the end of December.

another refashioning session. In addition to the refashion session, every attendee who bought someone along with them had their name put into a draw on the night to win a recycled leather clutch bag.

The Little Big Swish didn't attract as many people as hoped, but the people who did attend were very impressed with the event. Even though the numbers weren't much of an

improvement on the last event, we have noticed that we are attracting different people and it's not always the same individuals. However there seems to be a core group who have become regular visitors to all our swishes and are constantly spreading the word about our events.

Following the closure of the Re-use Hotline with London Reuse Network in September 2015, LB Ealing has now started a bespoke Re-use hotline that is co-ordinated and run by Furnish. So far they have carried out 83 collections with 303 items sent for re-use.

To promote the new hotline and service 140,000 leaflets were printed and sent out in the winter issue of Ealing Council's borough magazine – Around Ealing.

Year to date a total of 188 collections have been made with over 679 items sent for re-use weighing 22.28 tonnes.

Rubbish Diet also appointed a new west London Co-ordinator – Rishika Aurora to replace their previous coordinator Sarah Kersey. They've attended 11 events and spoken to 216 people across all their events this quarter.



Rubbish Diet Champions are people and groups who want to do more. This quarter, 30 of their champions completed at least one action. For example **M**, **J** and **P** from Harrow visited SWEEEP, **M** from Southall visited FareShare to find out how to access surplus food for their community group, **S** from Hounslow promoted the Rubbish Diet in a local newsletter and **D**, **C** and **K** promoted the Bhangra Disco Soup in Ealing.

Rubbish Diet will be working in conjunction with our team and FareShare London to put on a Love Food Hate Waste event on 25<sup>th</sup> Feb in Southall. They will also be holding a swish in collaboration with Age UK in Hounslow on 8<sup>th</sup> Feb.

# **Progress**

WLWA submitted a joint bid with Wrap and Zero Waste Alliance UK and a number of European municipalities to raise awareness of food waste and share best practice back in September. Our role in the 125,000 Euro project was to host a 3 day conference at Hounslow Civic Centre in January 2017 and hold a variety of food related events in the same financial year. Unfortunately the joint bid was unsuccessful.

WLWA also submitted a bid to the Department of Business Innovation and Skills (BIS) for funding in their WEEE Improvement Project in October. Unfortunately, we were also unsuccessful with this bid but did receive useful feedback about our idea.

# **Progress**

This quarter has seen a number of changes in the team. One of our Waste Minimisation Officers left to travel the world, our Events Assistant finished at the end of October and our Waste Minimisation Coordinator started maternity leave in November.

The remaining Waste Minimisation Officer has been seconded to become Senior Waste Minimisation Officer. We also advertised externally and hired 2 new Events Assistants in November – 1 full time and 1 part time.
