Progress

In February 2016, we ran our first big food waste event in west London - Ready, Steady, Love Food Evening event at the Dominion Centre in Southall. Surplus foodstuff and ingredients from the food redistribution organisation FareShare were collected, prepared and used to create a number of tasty dishes on the night by chef Marie.

The event was aimed at bringing residents and local community groups together to learn and share knowledge about food waste in west London. Activities on the night included welcome and introductions by Councillor Bassam Mahfouz; a food waste presentation by WLWA Director, Jim Brennan; group activities to share food waste knowledge; community group networking and two chefs preparing dishes using surplus food that would have otherwise gone to waste.



Facilitation of the nights activities was co-ordinated by The Rubbish Diet, FareShare London, Ealing Council and chefs from Children's Food Trust and Bain Marie. By the end of the nights activities, residents and community groups came together to share each other's experiences of the food waste issue and eat the lovely food prepared by our chefs.

Progress

A total of 7 Swishes were held this quarter - 6 in libraries and one Little Big Swish event held at the Beck Theatre in Hillingdon borough. A combined total of 137 people visited our swishes overall and swapped **747 items** weighing approximately **263 kg**.

For our third and final Little Big Swish of the year we changed location and did the event at the Beck Theatre in Hayes in the London Borough of Hillingdon. The format remained similar to our previous events and Gema, from fashion blog Sequins & Slippers, was invited back to hold another refashioning session.

In addition to the refashion session, a prize draw was also held on the night for one attendee to win an upcycled bag refashioned from a used coffee bean sack. The prize draw winner, Terri, was delighted to have won on the day and has been a regular attendee at a number of our swishing events.

The website we launched last year to give people all the information they need to run their own swishing events is still live and received **577 visitors** between January and the end of March.

Progress

Following the closure of the Re-use Hotline with London Reuse Network in September 2015, LB Ealing has now started a bespoke Re-use hotline that is coordinated and run by Furnish.

To promote the new hotline and service 140,000 leaflets were printed and sent out in the winter issue of Ealing Council's borough magazine – Around Ealing.

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Year to date a total of **246 collections** have been made with **861 items** sent for re-use weighing **20.02 tonnes**.

Progress

This quarter saw the bulk of our events happen as part of our annual new year focus on small WEEE recycling. The events that took place included:

- Civic Centre (Harrow) Feb 2016
- Environmental Awareness Week (Harrow College Wealdstone & Harrow on the Hill campuses) –
 Feb 2016
- Civic Centre (Richmond) Mar 2016

As well as bring events, the team ran a schools WEEE collection competition during Waste Week – (7th – 11th March 2016). Run in conjunction with Wastebuster and EDF Energy's education arm, The Pod, primary schools were contacted across our west London boroughs and encouraged to sign up for a free collection during Waste Week.



We had a fantastic response with 11 schools taking part. Children were given free bags to take home and collect as much small WEEE in the bags and bring it back in to school during Waste Week. The bags were collected and each school had their collected WEEE weighed up with a prize going to the school who had the most WEEE collected per pupil.



St Edmunds Catholic Primary School in Twickenham, Richmond upon Thames were the overall winners collecting an amazing **91kg per pupil** as a school.

The school won £500 worth of vouchers to spend on school or sports equipment in the Wastebuster online store.
