This project involved the following activities:

- 30-35 cooking clubs to be recruited from the existing Let's Get Cooking network in West London's six boroughs including training (£16,000)
- Grants of £300 to be given to each cooking club for further equipment and ingredients (£10,500)
- Three, one-day demonstrator training courses, scheduled for July 2013 to focus on Love Food Hate Waste messages
- One, one-day follow up training for all West London clubs to be held in October 2013 (£12,500)
- Further year two grants of £225 for the west London clubs trained in July 2012 (£2,250)
- Further year two grants of £100 for the west London clubs trained in November/December 2012 (£2,000)

The project delivered by Let's Get Cooking over 2 years from April 2012 produced the following results to the end of December 2013. It should be noted that many of the clubs are funded until July 2014 and 34 clubs have not submitted any monitoring data even though this was a requirement of their funding so these figures do not represent the full extent of the people engaged. When follow up was carried out with the clubs to ask why they had not reported data they cited technical issues with the website or ability to use the web themselves as the reasons.

- 195 cooking sessions have been run
- 22 community events have been held with 3,152 people attending (increased from 20 and 2,000)
- Total beneficiaries = 4,419
- 1,572 new skills have been learned
- 55 clubs were run – this was fewer than expected, several dropped out after receiving training

Once the skills and knowledge are learned people are likely to continue using them. The work done by Let's Get Cooking on this project has also been featured by the LFHW programme as a good practice case study.

Let's Get Cooking and WLWA worked closely to promote the work being done and to share ideas and tips on social media. Let's Get Cooking featured a guest [blog](#) written by WLWA about reducing food waste on their website during European Week for Waste Reduction in November 2013.

<p>Analysis has occurred in 5 schools and reports sent to them outlining the results of the food waste analysis and further actions they could carry out:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ St Mary Magdalen's Catholic Primary School (Richmond) ▪ Whitehall Junior School (Hillingdon) ▪ Grove Road Primary (Hounslow)* ▪ Orleans Park Senior School (Richmond)* ▪ Uxendon Primary School (Brent)* <p>*Only 1 week of analysis occurred during 2013/14 financial year.</p> <p>Each school was visited to see how much food left on plates at lunch time was thrown away. Over a 5 day period the amount, type of food and the number of children discarding it were recorded in each school. This information was used to work out how much food would have been thrown away over a year. Each school received a report outlining this information and a number of suggestions were given to help them reduce the amount of food thrown away. A second visit then occurred 4 - 5 months later.</p> <p>St Mary Magdalen's Catholic Primary School Between the two visits the weight of food thrown away from plates decreased by 20.9% to the equivalent of 1.71 tonnes a year. This means a reduction from 45.35g per pupil to 35.86. There was also a 15% reduction in the number of whole or partial food items not eaten to 39,120 per year. The work to look at food waste was well publicised in the schools newsletter, homework activities were set to make sure the children were aware and the children ran an assembly. WLWA also did an information stall to parents at the end of school.</p> <p>Whitehall Junior School The work at Whitehall saw a reduction in food waste at lunch time of 9.5% to 2.01 tonnes a year, from 29.21g of food waste per pupil to 26.45g. However the number of whole or partially eaten food items increase by 16% to 45,720. Between the two weeks when the measurement took place the EcoWarriors looked at the results and a number of Food Monitors were recruited to help encourage children eat more, they started after the second analysis took place. The school took the results of this work to the catering company and they agreed to make some changes including discontinuing 6 of the low uptake or highly wasted items, removing the crispy topping from the fish (children left the topping) and cutting the pizzas in to 8 slices instead of 6 to reduce parts of slices left on plates.</p>				

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<p>Uxendon Primary School The two weeks of this analysis happened almost a year apart. Between the two visits the weight of food waste decreased by 20.3% but the number of items increased by 9.8%. The one difference between these two weeks was that the school had introduced the policy that no child could leave the table without a member of staff checking their plate/lunchbox, children are then encouraged to eat more.</p> <p>Grove Road Primary We were only able to do one week of analysis because of staff changes at the school. We found that the weight of food waste per year would be around 2.06 tonnes and 36,400 items would be thrown away. The majority of this was hot school meals.</p> <p>Orleans Park Senior School Food waste was different at this school because of the way older children eat. With more food eaten during the morning break time, being able to eat outside the dining room and they had wider choice. Based on our work 0.89 tonnes of food waste and 14,680 items would be thrown away in a year.</p>

Six events took place across West London for Compost Awareness Week (6 – 13 May). The compost was supplied by West London Composting.

- Brent – on 7th May at Abbey Road HRRC 10 tonnes of compost was given away to 200 households
- Ealing – on 11th May ion Walpole Park around 200 residents collected up to 100 litres of compost each, 10 tonnes was given away
- Harrow – three giveaways took place at Kenton Recreation Ground (9th), Roxeth Recreation Ground (10th) and Harrow Civic Centre (11th). 235 households came along to collect the compost.
- Hounslow – At Hounslow Heath on 27th April 350 households came along to collect around 100 litres of compost to take and use at home. All 10 tonnes was collected in 2 ½ hours.

A total of 985 households collected compost, most people came in pairs to the event so over 1000 people were spoken to about composting and had their questions answered about recycling too.

Three newspapers featured information (Brent and Kilburn Times, London Evening Standard and Hounslow Chronicle) and on social media the Twitter opportunities to see were 55,717.

Development of the game is progressing well but it isn't finished yet. During the course of the year funding was obtained through Wastebuster to make the game more complex in terms of the look and feel of the game. The game is now a fully interactive attractive game to really engage children. It is called Wastebuster Universe and it is a universe held captive by the Evil Bin who wants all the rubbish including things that should be recycled. He has captured the planets dedicated to reducing, re-using and recycling textiles, food and electrical items. Starting at Planet Bin each Cadet needs to explore the planet to find out about the topic, take the Brain Bank challenge to show their knowledge and if they get the questions right they free the planet and move on to the next world.

There is still work to be completed to programme all the design features, the game needs to be tested and amended following any feedback and then in needs to be launched. Work will continue on this project and it will be launched during 2014.

<p>WLWA chose to introduce the Rubbish Diet to west London as everyone who takes part in the challenge becomes a champion of their own bin and results from elsewhere show that</p> <p>With the funding available it was only possible to run The Rubbish Diet in one borough, Harrow chose to introduce it. The Diet ran from September to March 2014. During this period 164 people from Harrow signed up to take part and 22 people from other west London boroughs. 30 of these became really involved with reducing their bins and have been approached to become recruiters of their neighbours.</p> <p>Debra, the Harrow Bin Doctor and Harrow resident started in November. She also attended a number of events and spoke to groups about the Rubbish Diet, including St Peter's Church, Pinner Wood School, Harrow Neighbourhood Champions and Asian Women's Network.</p> <p>Harrow residents were encouraged to take the Diet over 4 weeks starting in mid-January. Each week there was a feature on Harrow Community radio and getwestlondon.com featured news and information as well as printed information in the Harrow Observer. Sarah Thorp, caterer and mum from Harrow was featured on the radio.</p> <p>People who took the Diet changed their waste habits, on average Harrow Dieters reduced their bins by nearly 40% volume. Even people who did not notice a difference in the amount of rubbish in their bins started to avoid packaging and recycle more. One Dieter who slimmed her bin by 75% explained "It's changed the way I think about waste, forever".</p>
